- For exhibiting any of the behaviours that are reflected in their behaviour. ie. picking up rubbish, playing well together, looking after their peers, doing well at something. The duty teacher has them but I think they can be given out by the class room teachers too?
- been seen doing a step to success ie picking up litter - pride
- By displaying the steps to success values
- behaviour attitude achievement

5. Can we improve the Steps to Success?

Comments

- Always improvement can be sought. Idea could be to follow intermediate example of receiving steps to success badges when students achieve a specified level within each step.
- Nothing is ever perfect.....
- The distribution of stars seem quite arbitrary, if a child is the right place at the right time they get a star.
- Maybe give gold stars to the students. In year 1 say each student is given one star to give to another when they identify one of the steps in their peers. (Maybe relationships when they are learning that in year one). The amount of stars dished out could increase for the older classes.
- I think that if they have worked well over the last few years and the staff still sees them as a valuable component to the teaching and learning and behaviour in the school then they should be kept. The students clearly understand them and like the reward system. It is the old saying 'if it ain't broke - don't fix'.
- I believe there is always room for improvement but as above, Glamorgan is doing a fantastic job, my son is fully aware of the values & their meaning and he enjoys 'living' them - Thank you :-)
